



U.S. DISTRICT & BANKRUPTCY COURTS FOR THE DISTRICT OF IDAHO

2006 ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY



OVERVIEW

2006 was a challenging year, marked by a number of new initiatives, including final approval for the construction of a new courthouse in Coeur d'Alene. This project is expected to be completed in the Fall of 2008. Bankruptcy courts across the country continue to experience the impact of the Bankruptcy Reform Act. This included adopting Interim Rules, New Forms, and increased statistical reporting requirements. The long-term ramifications are uncertain but recent filings have returned to historical levels. As one of the few Consolidated District & Bankruptcy courts in the country, the District of Idaho has been able to meet the challenges of new legislation and its impact on staffing and the Court's budget. During the past year, we also began sharing administrative services with Probation & Pretrial Services in the budget, procurement and finance areas.

During this period, the Court implemented three new ECF versions and civil case opening became mandatory for members of the Bar. The successful transition to Electronic Filing is a testament both to the diligence of the Court and the acceptance of new technology by the Bar. The Court also completed final testing of a new District Court calendar program called CEO. Our District is a development partner with the Southern District of Texas in testing and modifying this new calendaring program which works in conjunction with ECF.

Despite local Congressional support over the past few years, the District of Idaho remains one of the few Districts in the country with only two Article III District Judges. Consequently, this necessitates the extensive use of visiting judges from neighboring districts to assist in the case management process. We are proud of all our 2006 accomplishments, as reflected in the following summary.

NEW COEUR D'ALENE COURTHOUSE

"Access to Justice" ...

The official ground-breaking ceremony for the construction of the new Federal Courthouse in Coeur d'Alene took place on February 13th, 2007. The three-story structure will be located off of Highway 95 and Mineral Drive, adjacent to the Hecla Mining Building, in a forest-like setting. The new Courthouse will contain two full-size



courtrooms and judges chambers, a grand jury room, the Clerk's Office and ancillary space and will occupy approximately 25,000 square feet. The building will also house U.S. Probation & Pretrial Services, the U.S. Attorney, U.S. Trustee, and U.S. Marshal Service. This project is expected to be completed in the Fall of 2008.

ELECTRONIC CASE FILING (CM/ECF)

We are starting our third year in CM/ECF, the electronic filing system, which officially began on January 1, 2005. Under the ECF program, registered attorneys electronically file cases, documents and pleadings in pdf (portable document format) via the Internet and receive electronic notification by e-mail. The District of Idaho was the first combined District & Bankruptcy Court to "go live" on CM/ECF at the same time and accomplished this feat in less than nine months. In addition, Idaho was the only District to successfully complete formal, hands-on training of over 1700 attorneys and paralegals in just a three-month period. Training classes were held throughout the state at the federal courthouses, computer labs, hotels and at individual law firms. During 2006, the Pay.gov program was successfully implemented whereby attorneys are able to use credit cards to complete their online ECF filings which require the payment of fees, including *pro hac vice* applications. The Court also provided voluntary training sessions in conjunction with the transition to the Pay.gov system. Furthermore, in addition to the comprehensive "hands-on" training courses, an online proficiency testing and certification program was also installed last year and an "advanced" ECF training class was also presented. In addition, ECF training is now being offered as the University of Idaho School of Law for 3rd-year students. Overall, the electronic filing program has resulted in substantial savings of both time and money for the Courts and the Bar alike.

THIRD DISTRICT JUDGESHIP EFFORTS

The Judicial Conference of the United States approved a "temporary" third District Judgeship for the District of Idaho in 2006, although this has not yet been funded by Congress. In the past, this Congressional legislation had been tied to a Bill to Split the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. It is anticipated that the official duty station of any additional judge would be the new Courthouse now being built in Coeur d'Alene.

CEO CALENDAR

After extensive testing and several local customized enhancements, the CEO calendar program, (short for Chambers Electronic Organizer) was installed for the District Court. The Bankruptcy Court had been using this Program since 2005. This software was developed by another consolidated district, the Southern District of Texas. In conjunction with the implementation of CM/ECF, the District of Idaho was selected as a development partner to evaluate and test this calendar program. It offers certain search capability not available with its predecessor.

TELEWORK PILOT PROJECT

A Telework Pilot Project was successfully conducted at our Coeur d'Alene divisional office whereby each staff member was afforded the opportunity to perform their regular duties and responsibilities from home for one day during a two-week period. The preliminary results of this program with respect to productivity, service and quality were very positive. It is expected that Telework will be an important element for emergency preparedness in the event our Continuity of Operations Plan is activated.

"Community Outreach" ...

ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

In 2006, the Annual District Conference / Federal Practice Program returned to its successful "road show" format. Programs were conducted in Boise, Pocatello, and Coeur d'Alene over a three-month span. The "What's New" portion of the Program included topics such as: The Ripple Effect of Bankruptcy Reform; New Federal Rule Changes; ECF Update; Practical ECF Pointers for the Lawyer and Law Firm; and E-Briefs. The Program also included a Mediation presentation, "What the Attorney Needs to Know/Do to be Successful in Mediation"; a Gender Fairness Presentation entitled, "Mars and Venus - How do they coexist in the Courtroom"; a presentation on "ACTL - Code of Trial & Pretrial Conduct"; and a Federal Judges' Panel Q&A Session. Chief Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Mary M. Schroeder was also in attendance. There were 5.25 CLE credits awarded, including 1.0 Ethics credit.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH GRANT PROGRAM

Recipients of the 2006 Community Outreach Grants included the Bankruptcy Resource Line and the Citizens Law Academy. A total of \$6000 was awarded by the Judges and Lawyer Representatives. Each year, subject to the availability of sufficient funds in the District of Idaho's Non-Appropriated Fund, a portion of the proceeds are awarded to programs which enhance public trust and confidence in the judiciary; promote a better understanding of the judiciary and legal processes; and improve communication with the public about the role of courts and the legal process. The grant funding must be related in some way to community education. The application deadline is April 1st of each calendar year. The District of Idaho has announced that a total of \$7,300 will be available for the Community Grant Program for 2007. PRO SE / PRO BONO PROGRAM

With Pro Se filings accounting for a full one-third of all civil filings during 2006, the Pro Se / Pro Bono Program was instrumental in managing and resolving these civil cases. Each fiscal year, approximately 20% of the Non-Appropriated Fund Balance is allocated to this Program. During 2006, the number of approved cases in which payments were made from the Pro Se/ Pro Bono Program Fund increased by 150%, while the actual monetary reimbursement rose by 425%. The funds are used exclusively to cover volunteer, Court-appointed counsel's out-of-pocket expenses.

FEDERAL BAR ASSOCIATION

In 2006, the Idaho Chapter of the Federal Bar Association sponsored a two-day, Multi-State CLE at Sun Valley on September 22nd & 23rd. The Program included topics such as: "The Politicalization of the Federal Bench"; Chief District Judges Panel; "Federal Sentencing post-Booker"; "U.S. Bankruptcy Practice - Fraud Referrals & BAPCA"; "The Trial of the Century"; "Strategic Issues in Electronic Discovery"; Federal Courts and Electronic Discovery"; and "Ethical Considerations in Electronic Discovery." Now in its third year, the Idaho Chapter of the Federal Bar Association boasts well over 100 members. The Association assists with continuing legal education and serves as a resource to the Lawyer Representatives and Court in conducting educational programs such as the District Conferences. The Idaho Chapter of the Federal Bar Association received the FBA's 2006 Outstanding Newsletter Recognition Award, primarily attributable to the volunteer efforts of Susie Boring-Headlee, who serves as both publisher and editor-in-chief of the publication.

COURTROOM RENOVATION PROJECT

During 2006 we embarked on a renovation project involving the 5th and 6th Floor courtrooms. The work on the 6th floor courtrooms was primarily to improve ADA access, whereas the 5th floor project involved a complete technological “make-over.” This included the installation of state-of-the-art evidence presentation and video conferencing equipment. The Court recently conducted several hands-on demonstration/ training sessions for the Bar in which attorneys and their trial support staff could try out the new equipment as well as ensure its connectivity with their personal notebook computers.

"Public Trust and Confidence" ...

JUDICIAL SERVICE ON NATIONAL & CIRCUIT COMMITTEES

During 2006, Chief District Judge B. Lynn Winmill continued his service on the United States Judicial Conference Committee on Information Technology. The membership term of this prestigious appointment has been extended until October 2008. Some of the duties of this committee include reviewing and recommending programs that support information technology such as electronic public access, courtroom technology, electronic filing and voice telecommunications programs. Chief Judge Winmill served on the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals Judicial Council in 2006 and 2007 and also represented the Conference of Chief District Judges as its Chair. The Ninth Circuit Judicial Council promulgates all necessary and appropriate orders for the effective and expeditious administration of justice within the Circuit.

Chief Bankruptcy Judge Terry L. Myers is a member of the Conference of Chief Bankruptcy Judges and is actively involved in the new Coeur d'Alene Project. Bankruptcy Judge Jim D. Pappas continues his service on the Ninth Circuit Bankruptcy Appellate Panel (BAP) in addition to being a member of the Federal Judicial Center (FJC) Bankruptcy Education Committee.

Magistrate Judge Larry M. Boyle continues to serve on the United States Judicial Conference Committee on the Administration of the Magistrate Judges System. The Committee consists of eleven district judges and three magistrate judges representing all of the federal circuits. The Committee makes policy recommendations to the United States Judicial Conference relating to the administration of the Magistrate Judge System. During 2006, Chief Magistrate Judge Larry M. Boyle was appointed to serve on the Ninth Circuit Public Information and Community Outreach (PICO) Committee. Chief Magistrate Judge Williams serves on the Ninth Circuit's Conference of Chief Magistrate Judges Committee.

VISITING JUDGES

The District of Idaho continues to rely heavily upon visiting judges to assist in managing its caseload. During 2006, visiting judges accounted for 334 hours of court proceedings in our District. This represents about 40% of all District Judge hours.

"Independence and Accountability"

STATEWIDE JUDGE ASSIGNMENT PROCESS

In 2006, Chief Judge Winmill authorized the implementation of a civil case assignment system which provides that the District and Magistrate Judges receive a percentage of northern, eastern and southern cases. This system provides more access to the federal judges in all locations of the state.

TRAINING FOR STATE JUDGES

Chief Bankruptcy Judge Myers presented a Training Program to the State District Judges in January 2006 about the impact and changes of the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 2005.

HISTORIC JOINT ATTORNEY ADMISSION PROGRAM

In 2006, the Justices of the Idaho Supreme Court and the Federal Judges agreed to consolidate their respective efforts and hold a joint attorney admission ceremony. The first program was conducted at the State Capitol with over 350 people in attendance. Before this initiative, new attorneys participated in a two separate ceremonies at the Supreme Court followed by another program at the Federal Court. The participants all agreed that this successful joint format would be retained in the future.

"Expedition and Timeliness" ...

CASE MANAGEMENT

In stark contrast to the record-setting number of Bankruptcy filings during 2005 (11,808), there were only 2,743 bankruptcy filings during all of 2006. This disparity was felt nationwide, not just in the District of Idaho. In the District Court, civil filings only dropped 1% during 2006. Despite a 14% decrease in criminal filings, over the past decade, criminal filings have risen almost 100%. Likewise, during the same time frame, pending criminal cases have increased over 165%. The number of civil trials rose 14% last year, while the number of criminal trials increased 26%.

ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION (ADR)

The percentage of cases participating in mediation in our District continues to increase. During 2006, the number of cases participating in mediation represented 36% of all civil cases filed in the District of Idaho. During the past three years, the number of cases referred to mediation totaled 499. The Court's current success rate for cases referred to mediation is approximately 64%. The ADR Staff Attorneys and Magistrate Judge Mikel Williams presented a program in 2006 at the Ninth Circuit Pro Se Conference in which they demonstrated the use of mediation for pro se cases. The use of ADR in civil cases over the past year has certainly proven helpful in assisting parties in resolving their disputes.

WI FI SYSTEM FOR COURTROOMS

The installation of a Wi-Fi Network in the Federal Courthouse in Boise was completed during 2006 and the Wi-Fi networks in Pocatello and Coeur d'Alene were completed in early 2007. This now allows attorneys to access the Internet for business purposes. The Wi-Fi is accessible in all courtrooms and witness rooms. Detailed instructions and restrictions concerning the use of the Wi-Fi system can be found on our webpage. In a recent change of policy, an access card and codes are no longer required to use the System. The project is being funded by the Attorney Admission Fund.

"Cooperation and Collaboration" ...

ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO SOUTHERN DISTRICT OF LOUISIANA

During 2006, the District of Idaho provided much-needed assistance to the Southern District of Louisiana in the wake of the Hurricane Katrina disaster. The District of Idaho docketing team opened 250 civil cases in ECF for the Southern District of Louisiana.

FEDERAL & STATE JUDICIARY JOINT EFFORTS

The State /Federal Judicial Council met twice during 2006. Recent successful collaborative efforts include a joint Federal/State Attorney Admission Ceremony and the development of a protocol involving interstate detainers. The federal court also participated in the *Tribal Court Forum*, a day-long sharing of information between the state courts, federal courts and tribal courts. In the past, the federal and state judiciary have jointly worked on several initiatives including gender fairness, interpreter certification, Bankruptcy Reform, emergency preparedness, and the use of electronic certification of documents. During 2006, the state and federal judiciary jointly sponsored a number of court interpreter orientation and skill-building workshops as well as offering the certification examination. This project has resulted in the certification of additional Spanish Interpreters that are used in both the state and federal courts.

LAWYER REPRESENTATIVES

Barry McHugh, a partner in the Coeur d'Alene law firm of Elsaesser, Jarzabek, Anderson, Marks, Elliott & Mc Hugh, was appointed to a three-year term as the new lawyer representative, replacing outgoing lawyer rep Ron Kerl. Barry will join current lawyer representatives Keith Roark and Deb Kristensen.

After receiving his J.D. from the University of Idaho School of Law, Mr McHugh served for 15 years as a prosecuting attorney with the city of Coeur d'Alene, Kootenai County, the Idaho Attorney General's Office and the U. S. Attorney's Office. He has been in private practice since 2002, which has included all areas of civil, criminal, bankruptcy, business and family law. Barry is licensed to practice in all state and federal courts in Idaho as well as the Federal Court of Appeals.

Typical duties a lawyer representative include: serving as the representative of the bar to advance opinions and suggestions for improvement; assisting the Court in the implementation of new programs or procedures; serving on court committees; and developing curriculum for training programs.

ANNUAL CJA CONFERENCE

The Annual Western All-Star Criminal Defense Conference & Confabulation took place on Friday, August 25th, 2006 at the Boise Centre on the Grove. This Program was jointly sponsored by the U.S. District Court for the District of Idaho and the Federal Defenders of Eastern Washington & Idaho. Presentations included: “*Jury Selection: It’s Nice to Have Friends*” by Richard Kammen; “*That Reminds me of a Story!*” by Keith Belzer; “*Criminal Defense Lawyer: Liberty’s Last Champion*” by U.S. District Judge David Carter; “*Closing: The Finishing Touch*” by Andrea Lyon; “*Sentencing Videos: Take 1*” by Amy Rubin; “*Making your Appeal Appealing*” by Tom Monaghan; and “*What Happens in State Court Stays in State Court*” by Maria Andrade. The Capital Habeas Conference was held the following day at the same location. CLE credits were awarded for each session.

REVISED BANKRUPTCY LOCAL RULES

The District of Idaho Bankruptcy Local Rules Committee worked diligently to successfully complete a comprehensive revision of the Bankruptcy Court Local Rules, which after a month-long comment period, became effective on January 1, 2007. A new Model Chapter 13 Plan was also adopted. Many of the changes were necessitated by the nationwide implementation of the Bankruptcy Reform Act on October 17, 2005 as well as by ECF, the electronic filing system.

CM/ECF USERS GROUP COMMITTEE

A CM/ECF Users Group Committee, jointly composed of District of Idaho Court staff, selected Idaho State Bar federal court practitioners, and representative from various governmental agencies was formed during 2006 to assist the Court in guiding future CM/ECF efforts. The following initiatives have been completed by the Committee: conducting ECF training at the University of Idaho Law School; conducting advanced ECF training for paralegal groups; hosting computer labs for ECF question-and-answer sessions; and the development of an on-line ECF training program, which will allow attorneys to be certified on the Internet. Court Training Coordinator Suzi Butler spearheads this ongoing project.

IDAHO LEGAL HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The District of Idaho continued its involvement with the Idaho Legal Historical Society. Some of this organization’s ongoing initiatives include: an oral history project; writing historical articles for publication; and, conducting a series of fund-raising events for the benefit of the Society. A re-enactment of the famous “Big” Bill Haywood trial entitled, “The Gate on 16th Avenue,” was performed at the Boise Little Theater on March 15-17, 2007. Furthermore, Idaho Public Television is currently in the process of filming a documentary on this topic, which involved the assassination of former Idaho Governor Frank Steunenberg in 1907, commonly referred to as the “Trial of the Century.” The December 2006 issue of *The Advocate* was entirely devoted to Idaho Legal History.

SERVICE ON NINTH CIRCUIT ADVISORY COMMITTEES

During 2006 Candy W. Dale, from Hall, Farley, Oberrecht & Blanton, continues to serve her three-year term on the Ninth Circuit Advisory Board. The mission of this Committee is to research issues and assist the Ninth Circuit on such initiatives as improving relations between the Judiciary and Congress, supporting new judgeships and enhanced budgets. In addition, lawyer representative Joe Meier will become the Chair of the Lawyer Representative Coordinating Committee. This Circuit-wide advisory committee provides recommendations and assistance to the Ninth Circuit Judicial Conference.

CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS PLAN (COOP)

During 2006, the District of Idaho continued to revise its Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) to take advantage of the increased use of replication servers, VPN connectivity to personal notebooks as well as some of the advancements in new technology. This Plan provides alternatives to the Court in the event of an emergency. Some of the issues specifically covered include: defining the essential functions of the court and devising strategies that would ensure their prompt resumption or continuation in either short or long-term emergencies.

"Equality, Fairness, and Integrity"...

BANKRUPTCY RESOURCE LINE

The District of Idaho has been working with the Bankruptcy Section of the State Bar and the Volunteer Lawyers Program to develop a Bankruptcy Resource Line. A Community Outreach Grant was previously awarded for this purpose. In general, this system would allow the Clerk's Office to refer pro se debtors to a telephone number, where the debtor could leave a voice mail about a particular legal issue. Thereafter, volunteer lawyers would screen the voice mail, return the call or refer the issue to another attorney. This will be an issue-specific service, rather than providing representation for the entire case.

GENDER FAIRNESS

In conjunction with the 2006 District Conference, the Federal Court conducted an on-line survey of all members of the Federal Bar in order to assess the state of Gender Fairness throughout the District of Idaho. The results were then compared with the Gender Fairness survey conducted in 1994. The 1994 study reported significant differences between males and females regarding gender and its impact upon professional conduct. In 2006, all categories reflected marked improvement with respect to the civility, demeanor and professionalism exhibited by members of the Bar and the Court.

**FEDERAL DEFENDER
SERVICES OF IDAHO**

The Criminal Justice Act (CJA) Plan (General Order # 210) was revised during 2006, in part, to describe the role of the newly-formed Federal Defender Services of Idaho, Inc in the representation of criminal defendants throughout the District of Idaho. Richard Rubin was selected as the first Executive Director of the Federal Defenders of Idaho by its

Board of Directors.










2006 Bankruptcy Filings - District of Idaho

For the 12 Month Period Ending December 31




BANKRUPTCY COURT HOURS BY LOCATION
