


DISTRICT COURT


A. **Civil Workload** After a significant increase the prior year, the number of civil filings decreased by 18% during 2005. Civil terminations dropped by 7% while pending civil cases went down 6%.


B. Civil Case Filings by Division During 2005, civil filings decreased in all but the Northern division (Coeur d'Alene), which actually rose 22%. The Southern division (Boise) declined by 16% while the Central division (Moscow) dropped by 26%. The Eastern division (Pocatello) experienced the largest decrease, 37%.

C. Civil Case Filing Trend by Type The total number of private civil cases decreased by 15% during 2005 while the total number of civil cases involving the United States dropped 28%. The only categories of government civil cases which increased included: Social Security cases, tax suits and labor cases. The remaining types of government cases all decreased.


On the private side, the only increases were in “other real property,” which increased by 57% and “other personal injury, ” which went up 3%. The remaining private civil cases all reflected varying decreases, with the largest drops occurring in copyright cases (-70%), motor vehicle personal injury (-56%).

D. Pending Civil Case Age Analysis There was a 3% overall increase in the total number of civil cases pending at the end of 2004. Civil cases pending over three years increased by 24% while pending cases between two to three years went down by 13%. Civil cases pending from one to two years decreased by 16% whereas cases less than one year old rose 12%.




During 2005, the percentage of pending cases over three years old rose slightly in all but the Eastern division. The most significant changes occurred in civil cases pending in the Central and Eastern divisions between one and two years. The percentage of pending cases less than a year decreased in all the divisions.

E. CJRA Semi-Annual Reports Summary The amount of motions pending for more than six months decreased significantly (63%) during the two semi-annual reporting periods in 2005. Likewise, the number of cases over three years old also decreased by 22%. Since the inception of the mandatory CJRA semi-annual reports in September 1991, the District of Idaho has reduced the amount of motions pending for more than six months by 98%. During that same time frame, the number of civil cases pending for more than three years has decreased by 33%.






F. Pro Se Cases During 2005, pro se filings accounted for approximately 34% of all civil filings, which is about 3% more than in 2004. Prisoner pro se filings comprised 63% of all pro se filings.



G. Criminal Workload During 2005, criminal case filings increased 6% while criminal defendant filings rose by only 1%. Criminal case terminations increased by 3% while criminal defendant terminations went up by 5%. Pending criminal cases rose by 6% while pending criminal defendants increased 5%.



H. Criminal Case Filings by Divisional Office

The Eastern division (Pocatello) experienced the largest increase in criminal filings, including a 58% rise in case filings and a 47% jump in defendant filings. The Northern division (Coeur d’Alene) had a 4% increase in criminal case filings and a 9% rise in criminal defendant filings. Conversely, criminal cases filed in the Southern division (Boise) dropped by 12% while criminal defendants went down 19%. Likewise, the Central division (Moscow) reflected a 6% decrease in criminal case filings while defendant filings remained constant.


I. **Criminal Case Filing Trend by Type** During 2005, the most significant increases were theft, which increased 63%, federal statutes, which went up 127%, state statutes, which rose 60% and fraud, which increased 14%. The only categories which experienced a decline were violent crimes, which dropped 36% and drug offenses, which went down 6%.




J. Median Disposition Time During 2005, the median disposition time for civil cases increased by 3%. Conversely, the median disposition time for criminal cases dropped by 3%.





K. District Court Trial Activity During 2005, although the total number of combined civil and criminal trials increased by 10%, the combined days actually declined by 36% and the combined number of hours dropped by 48%. There was a significant increase in the number of criminal trials (26%). Likewise, the number of non-trial hearing days rose 6%.

L. District Court Trial Activity by Divisional Office During 2005, the Northern division (Coeur d'Alene) experienced a significant increase in the total number of civil trials. Likewise, the Southern division (Boise) also registered large gains in both the total number of criminal trials. The Eastern division (Pocatello) court trial activity remained relatively constant.
