


DISTRICT COURT


A. **Civil Workload** The number of civil filings increased by only 1% during 2007, after a similar drop the prior year. Civil terminations rose by 3% while pending civil cases went down 7%.


B. Civil Case Filings by Division During 2007, civil filings increased in two of the four divisions. The Southern (Boise) rose 2% while the Eastern division (Pocatello) increased by 8%. The Northern division (Coeur d'Alene) decreased by 4%, while the Central division (Moscow) dropped by 21%.

C. Civil Case Filing Trend by Type The total number of private civil cases decreased by 1% during 2006 while the total number of civil cases involving the United States dropped 3%. The categories of government civil cases which increased included: contracts (167%), tort actions (50%), civil rights (350%), and Social Security cases(24%). The remaining types of government cases all decreased.


On the private side, there were increases in real property (18%), motor vehicle personal injury (57%), antitrust (700%), commerce (300%), copyright(88%) and prisoner petitions (13%).

D. Pending Civil Case Age Analysis There was a 7% decrease in the total number of civil cases pending at the end of 2007. Civil cases pending over three years decreased by 20% while pending cases between two to three years dropped by 23%. Civil cases pending from one to two years decreased by 17% whereas cases less than one year old rose 1%.



During 2007, the percentage of pending civil cases over three years old dropped somewhat in all divisions. Likewise, the percentage of civil cases pending between 2 to 3 years went down in the Southern and Central divisions and remained constant elsewhere. The percentage of pending cases less than a year increased significantly in the Northern and Central divisions.



E. CJRA Semi-Annual Reports Summary

The most recent report of amount of motions pending for more than six months decreased significantly (42%) from the first semi-annual reporting period in 2007. Likewise, the number of cases over three years old also decreased by 11%. Since the inception of the mandatory CJRA semi-annual reports in September 1991, the District of Idaho has reduced the amount of motions pending for more than six months by 85%. During that same time frame, the number of civil cases pending for more than three years has decreased by over 55%.






F. Pro Se Cases During 2007, pro se filings accounted for approximately 43% of all civil filings, which was the highest ever. Prisoner pro se filings comprised 77% of all pro se filings.



G. Criminal Workload During 2007, criminal case filings increased by 16% while criminal defendant filings rose by 24%. Criminal case terminations went up by 12% while criminal defendant terminations only increased by 1%. Pending criminal cases rose by 8% while pending criminal defendants increased 18%.



H. Criminal Case Filings by Divisional Office

The Central division (Moscow) experienced the only increase in criminal filings, including a 12% rise in case filings and a 61% jump in defendant filings. Conversely, The Eastern division (Pocatello) had a 26% decrease in criminal case filings and a 33% drop in criminal defendant filings. Criminal cases filed in the Southern division (Boise) dropped by 8% while criminal defendants went down 13%. Likewise, the Northern division (Coeur d'Alene) reflected a 14% decrease in criminal case filings while defendant filings went down by 11%.


I. **Criminal Case Filing Trend by Type** During 2007, the most significant increases were immigration violations, which increased 39%, drug offenses, which went up 15%, and those cases which fall in the “other” category, which rose 42%. While federal statutes remained unchanged, the remainder of the categories all experienced declines of varying degrees, the most significant of which were fraud, which dropped 27% and theft, which went down 18%.




J. Median Disposition Time During 2007, the median disposition time for civil cases decreased by 2% while the median disposition time for criminal cases dropped by 6%.

K. District Court Trial Activity During 2007, the total number of combined civil and criminal trials increased by 10%, the combined days rose by 6% and the combined number of hours went up by 3%. There were significant increases in both civil and criminal categories, with civil trials increasing 25% and criminal trials going up 6%. This followed significant increases in virtually all categories during the prior year.



For the 12 Month Period Ending December 31



M. Visiting Judge Hours After a reaching an all time high during 2004, the amount of visiting judge hours over the past few years has somewhat declined. During 2007, the total number of visiting judge hours dropped by 40%. Despite the drop over the past few years, visiting judge hours still account for over 18% of all district judge hours.
